## The Silent Witness

Activity: Read <u>The Silent Witness</u>, have the students think back on the events of the Civil War. Pick one specific event, have the students put themselves in that place with their own "silent witness".

Objective: This activity is one that will pull writing into Social Studies but can also assess the students to see what they learned and remembered about a specific event that occurred during the Civil War.

- 1. Read the book <u>The Silent Witness a True Story of the Civil War</u> by Robin Friedman to the class.
- 2. As you are reading the book stop and make a list of events that occurred during the Civil War on the board. After reading the book brainstorm other events that were not specifically talked about in the book.
  - -Lincoln's Election
  - -Southern States Secession
  - Battle Petersburg (Crater Explosion)
  - -Battle Fredericksburg (Martha Stevenson house)
  - -Battle of Manassas/Bull Run
  - -Battle of Gettysburg
  - -Brown's Island Explosion
  - -Appomattox
  - -Fort Sumter
- 3. Have the students pick one of the events from the list. Students should write it down on their paper.
- 4. Talk to students about what a *silent witness* is, or could be to them.
  - a. Example: doll, stuffed animal, book, block, drum, ect...
- 5. Students write a short story of their own *Silent Witness* and what even it witnessed during the Civil War.
- 6. Students will then get on the program TinkerCad and design a replica of the item that witnessed the major event during the war.
